My work at the Savannah Baptist Center began with a God given desire to serve. As a new resident to Savannah I wanted to volunteer in a ministry setting. I remembered the ministry of the Baptist Center in Johnson City, TN, so I did a quick Google search and found the Savannah Baptist Center (SBC). I browsed through the webpage and thought, "I want to be involved with the work there." I called the center and within a few days I was volunteering. I started to work right away in the food pantry, stocking donated food items and preparing food bags for individuals and families. This is an opportunity to share God's love with people by listening to their stories and coming alongside them in difficult times. I know the Lord cares for every person that walks through the door, and He wants them to know that He loves them and has provided forgiveness for their sins and eternal salvation through Jesus. We want them to know Jesus as their personal Lord and Savior. That is the greatest need, more than food.

Sometimes I volunteer in the clothes closet. Working there may include putting away donated clothing items and shoes, finding a shirt or pair of

pants for someone's upcoming interview, or assisting people as they come to clothes closet and handing out hygiene kits. Aspects of the clothes closet remind me of Jesus. We are clothed in his righteousness when we accept Him as Lord and Savior, more than earthly clothes can buy. We are cleansed by His blood, more than soap may ever cleanse.

My time volunteering at the SBC has changed me, for the better. I have been blessed with the friendship and fellowship of other believers. I am part of the body of Christ serving with other members of the body. I have also realized that it is not really "I" who serves and cares, but Christ in me who serves and cares. Food in a gift bag or pushed in a cart. Single mom. Grandma and grandkids. Husband and wife. School supplies. Unemployed. No family. Can't afford the rent. Power shut off. Health problems. And so much more. As I look back upon my experience at the SBC, these are the memories that flash through my mind. Yet, I have peace and hope and trust that God is in control and making plans for good. ~Jessica, Volunteer

The Needs at the Center:

VOLUNTEERS:

- ♥ Clothing Closet: Sort, purge, organize donated items on Thursdays
- ♥ Food Pantry: Sort, purge, organize donated items as needed
- ♥ Record-keeping: Update our files on "the history of the Baptist Center"
- ♥ Building & Maintenance: Update our manual, assist with maintaining our building (i.e. patching walls, fresh coats of paint, minor repairs, etc.)
- ♥ Van Maintenance: Maintain a log and calendar on Center vehicles, scheduling maintenance as needed
- ♥ On-Call Assistance (technical, building or vehicle maintenance, mechanics, financial, yard maintenance, etc.)
- ♥ Other: teachers for future classes based on Biblical principals such as parenting skills, budgeting, time management, respecting authority, etc.

Looking to the Future

As I consider the various ministries that are taking place at the Savannah Baptist Center, I am reminded of Todd Beamer on flight 93 on that September morning when he realized his destination for the day had changed and he as well as the other passengers on that flight were facing certain death. He drew courage from his faith as he dialed 9-1-1 and after explaining their situation, he asked the emergency responder to pray "The Lord's Prayer" with him and tell his wife and kids that he loved them. The last words heard during that call were "are you ready? let's roll," followed by a scuffle and then silence. Thousands of lives were forever changed that day. As Todd drew courage from his faith, we are also acting courageously in faith with bold visions for the Center. During the last couple of years, my heart has been burdened that we are not fully utilizing the wonderful facilities that God has provided. Ministry is continuous each day at the center, but there is potential to offer much more. Several

months back I received a call from someone wishing to lease a portion of the old Family Dollar store to begin a "Heads Up Guidance Service" for those struggling with addictions or minor mental health problems. This would involve counseling, and job readiness training. Then recently the opportunity arose to provide temporary space for the "Sojourners" ministry which involves life skills as well as work skills training. Beginning in October, Yvonne Pryor, former director of women's division of Inner City Night Shelter will begin computer training and also a seven week CNA class where women can train and be certified as nursing assistants. This will prepare them for work, the opportunity to secure their own housing and offer them a brighter future. And then I remember how God is blessing the ministry and volunteers from Christ Church who work in the clothes closet and the many churches who prepare and serve breakfast each Sunday morning. And let us not forget that God sent us His Pastor to

lead the Savannah Baptist Center Church and the many who have received Christ and been baptized during the last two years. Ecclesiastes 3:1 states, "There is a time for everything, and a season for every activity under heaven." It was Mr. Lewis' desire that this building be used for a homeless shelter and training center, however the city would not zone it for that purpose. We now have the opportunity to fulfill part of his vision. God has provided beforehand for the plans He has for this Center. May we remain grounded in His Word and His promises and constantly seek His perfect will and then have the courage to be obedient to His will. Just as families' lives were changed as a result of 9/11, my prayer is that lives will be changed in this community as a result of boldly stepping outside the box of normalcy. May we borrow from the last words of Todd Beamer, "are you ready? Let's roll," and watch God work.
